Schools project - Research Day October 14

Jenny Francis is taking the lead on Llanthony (Upper Cwmyoy) school, and (Lower) Cwmyoy school; she went to both. Viv Davies is leading on Pandy school and Jenny Parry on Forest Coalpit with help from Mel and Ann Powell. The aim is to have a draft by the next Research Day in March. Other people interested in contributing memories or helping out would be very welcome.

A copious and delicious lunch was followed by a memories session, to which various ex-pupils had been invited including Ivor Watkins and Mary Powell (Llanthony School), Joan Watkins and Tony Smith (Cwmyoy School), and Edith Davies (Pandy school). There were also photos of various local houses, nearly all of which were identified during the day. David Filsell, who continues to work on his transport project, identified cars in the photographs. Pip presented a draft 'Llanthonypedia' description of geology in the area which Douglas will improve in time for the next Research Day on Saturday March 10.

Oliver Fairclough has completed a draft of the book about the history of Llanthony Valley and its environs to be published by the Landmark Trust in 2018. He made use of the research archives in our Dropbox folder, while a number of members helped supply photographs.

History group activities at Llwyn Celyn

A number of members attended a History Group visit to Llwyn Celyn on September 23rd. Caroline Stanford's commentary was greatly enjoyed. The major works should be finished by early 2018 and then work will begin on the inside. The new dendrochronological dating of beams to the 1420s suggests that Llwyn Celyn is the oldest roofed building in Wales. In the light of the new date Landmark has commissioned more historical research with a focus on the Priory at that time.

Some members of the committee met with Caroline and Kasia at Llwyn Celyn on 25th October to discuss the use of Llwyn Celyn outbuildings. The interpretation room will occupy the Beast house divided into two areas: the main beast house and the tack room. The tack room will contain a glazed noticeboard for the History Group which can be used to advertise events and contain photographs, research reports, etc. We were keen that there should be a

timeline and will develop suggestions of what should be on it at our Research Day on March 10th. There will also be a space for a stylised History Walk map accompanied by A4-sized folding leaflets for people to take showing what they should look out for. The Group has organised nine walks to date and these could form the basis of the initial leaflets with more added as new walks are designed.
