

The Llanthony Valley: a Borderland, published by the Landmark Trust



This book by Oliver Fairclough, which incorporates various pieces of History Group research, was formally launched in Cwmyoy Hall on September 19th before the AGM. More than 60 people came to the launch, many books were sold, and there was lots of chatting over wine and refreshments generously provided by Oliver and Caroline. Since then the Group's allocation from Landmark of 250 copies of the first printing has been sold and there have been inroads into the second printing, boosted by energetic selling by Jenny Parry. Cwmyoy Hall talks

At our *September* meeting Caroline Stanford, Landmark's historian, considered three questions about Llwyn Celyn: Whose land was it built on? How old is it? Who built it and why? And the answers? 'Baranau' (Bryn Arw) was endowed to Llanthony Priory in an 1127 charter from the Lord of Bergavenny. Llwyn Celyn was built in one go with timber felled between 1418 and 1421 and it was most likely built by an aspiring yeoman. In *October* Mari Fforde told the story of Hay Castle originally built in 1198 and currently being restored with the help of an HLF grant, while in *November* William Gibbs with volunteers from the history group shared a set of readings about interesting local residents, many taken from Valley Views. Our *December Christmas party* was preceded by a showing of video extracts from Voices of our Valley, expertly edited by Douglas Wright and followed by the film *On the Black Hill* based on the novel by Bruce Chatwin set on the eastern edge of the Black Mountains. After the film Jasper Fforde, who worked as the clapper loader on the film more than 30 years ago, described how many of the scenes were shot using photographs he took at the time.

History Walks

Blaen Bwch and the Carney: July 2018: On this walk we explored aspects of the history of Glyn Bwch, with a particular focus on two residents of the Carney. Reg Gammon (artist and farmer) bought the ruined farmhouse in 1940, re-built it and lived in it until the early 1960s when Tom Maschler, a publisher who brought many famous writers to the Carney and who still lives there, moved in. The walk started with a talk with slides by Pip about the Carney and residents and was followed by a visit to the Carney preceded by a short walk and talk about the interesting local geology by Douglas, a talk by Peter Davies about the Glyn Bwch Valley, and a picnic. Some people walked to a nearby little waterfall and some walked back down to Capel-y-ffin via Pen-y-maes with good views of the Monastery across the valley.

2019 history walks: Wednesday May 15th The Ffwyddog starting from the Pant – led by David Austin; time to be confirmed. June and July – months, dates and times to be confirmed: (1) Cwmyoy to Ty-Hunt-y-Bwlch; (2) Llanvihangel Crucorney including Llanvihangel Court.

Llwyn Celyn

On completion of the building works the Landmark Trust invited History Group members and other supporters to a special tour of the house and outbuildings on the afternoon of the 30th September.

History Group projects: **more researchers needed**- no experience necessary

Individual projects: You may already be involved in exploring the history of a topic that interests you that you might like to talk to others about, and there are endless possibilities if you are looking to start a new project.
