The history of Llanvihangel Court building and people:

In September *Oliver Fairclough* provided us with many photographs and some interesting answers to four questions: Why and when was the Court built? How did it work as a house? How has it changed over time? Who lived there? You can see his powerpoint here.





Local apple-growing and cider-making



In October we first heard about growing 17 varieties of apples at Llanfair Kilgeddin from *David Whittingham* who brought examples of 11 varieties to show us. Then *Bryn Probert* described how a group at the Crucorney allotments have so far taken 76 cuttings from old orchards and grafted them although they haven't yet identified all of them. *Oliver Fairclough* had found 17th century references to cider apple orchards in both the Llanthony and Grwyne Fawr valleys, while in the mid-19th century 20 of the larger farms in Cwmyoy parish had orchards including one at the Vishan. *Hilary Engel* described how they had

restored a 17th century cider mill after a gap of 100 years and were working it with a horse. The group's planned visit to an open weekend at <u>Fair Oak</u> was rained off Saturday 26th October but a number of members went individually the next day. The Priory and local churches



In November Jean Prosser talked about 'How the Priory and our Churches Came and Survived' in a story which covered 800 years from the arrival in Llanthony of the hermit William de Lacy in the early I 100s to the present day. Now the survival of the Priory depends on Government finance and people interested in heritage, and the survival of St David's church Llanthony and St Martin's Cwmyoy on the work, worship, care and money of local people.



Christmas party in December: This began with selected extracts of interviews from the Llanthony Show 'Voices of our Valley' project. The video collected amusing and interesting bits of interviews with six long-time residents who have died since they were interviewed: Graham Smith Blaenyoy, David Smith Roadside Cottage, Jeffrey Greenow Penyworlod (interviewed with Joan Greenow), Ivor Watkins Nantygwyddel (interviewed with Joan Watkins), John Williams Penywern, and Ken Harris Coed Farm. Miriam Griffiths and Colette Miles have joined the committee and we have set up two subcommittees. The Research Committee is taking our research programme forward, while an Events committee is working on something to celebrate our 5th anniversary in the autumn.

Researching our local schools

The 1870 education Act created School Boards funded through local rates and in 1880 school attendance to the age of 10 was made compulsory. People in Forest Coalpit had already organised to build a school under the auspices of the British and Foreign Society and it opened in 1869. Llanthony and Pandy schools opened in 1876 and Cwmyoy school in 1878. Llanthony school closed in 1957 with the few pupils moving to Cwmyoy school. When this closed in 1961 pupils moved to Forest Coalpit school. In 1968 the newly built Llanvihangel Crucorney school opened and the Forest Coalpit and Pandy schools closed. Pandy school was knocked down to make way for the A465.

Over the last couple of years we have accumulated school records, interviews, information from Valley Views and Voices of our Valley and other documents in our Dropbox folder. Key contributors include Jenny Francis, Christine Knight, Mel and Ann Powell, Viv Davies, and Judy Hood. The next step is to use Richard Davies' And so to school...The story of Pandy School from 1876 to 1926 as a guide to write booklets about each school.

Group visit to the Gwent Archives at Ebbw Vale
