Saturday September 3rd Tretower Court and Castle 2.30

Oliver Fairclough A guided tour of Tretower Court

Tretower Court, near Crickhowell, was the home of the Vaughans, an important gentry family, from the I450s to about I700. It then became a farmhouse, eventually passing to the Ministry of Works in a ruinous state in I934. This visit, led by Oliver Fairclough, will focus on the post-medieval history of Tretower Court - including the Parry family who farmed here, and the Court's extensive 20th century restoration.

Short AGM followed by Ryland Wallace Churchmen, Sportsmen and Women Musicians: Revd Thomas Jones and Family of Llanbedr

The Revd Thomas Jones was Rector of Llanbedr and Patricio from 1860 to 1902. He was a far from conventional churchman, marrying three times and having two sons and five daughters, the lives of whom brought him grief and heartbreak on the one hand and joy and celebration on the other.

October 19th Hay Castle 3.30

Mari Fforde, Learning and Activities Officer A private guided tour of Hay Castle

Dominating the town of Hay, the castle has been a Norman fortress, and later a Jacobean gentry house, before becoming the home of Richard Booth's kingdom of books. The castle suffered two devastating fires during the 20th century, and after a decade of restoration, it has recently opened for the first time to visitors.

David Filsell The Arrival of Powered Vehicles in the Llanthony Valley

A Daimler made its way to the Monastery in 1901 where it was cursed by Father Ignatius. Through the first half of the twentieth century the arrival of cars, motorcycles, buses, tractors, lorries and vans brought big changes to the way people worked, children got to school, and to everyone's social lives. Here are some reflections of those times.

February 15th Cwmyoy Hall

Panel (members tbc) The Rise and Fall of Pony-trekking in Llanthony Valley

In the 1950s farmers and others in the Valley looking for new sources of income discovered there was a demand for pony-trekking. Soon there were six businesses taking treks up both sides of the Valley and one of them was advertising in London using flyers. Demand held up into the 1990s but following a sharp decline most businesses closed in the early noughties. A panel of local people involved in trekking will share their memories and ask for more from the audience.

March 15th Cwmyoy Hall

Dick Vigers 'The Old General': The life and times of Rev. Morgan Lewis, Capel-y-ffin

Exotic visitors to the Llanthony valley in the 19th century made the attractions of the area known to a wider world; the local community, however, continued to follow a largely traditional, Welsh way of life. Central to this was the chapel and one of its pillars was Morgan Lewis who guided his Baptist flock for over 50 years, eventually becoming one of the 'wonders' of the valley himself.

April 19th Cwmyoy Hall

David Knight The Three Matthew Knights of Llanthony Abbey

Between 1873 and 1967 three successive generations of Matthew Knights worked as Stewards of the Llanthony Estate during its ownership by the Landor family. Matthew Knight, Matthew James Knight and Matthew Latham Knight lived in and managed the Abbey Hotel. They married local girls and played key roles in the local community especially in the church and Llanthony School.
